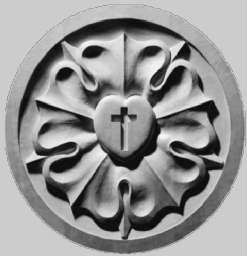

Pastor's Page

Hard Work

"Come unto me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart; and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." Matthew 11:28-30

Why do we find it so difficult to live the Christian life, if Jesus says, "My yoke is easy and my burden is light?" Shouldn't I find an easy path before me whenever I'm trying to do what I know is right?

Well, that's not exactly what Jesus says. The promise is rest, not ease. I had forgotten those little words, "and learn of me," in these verses. If I take the yoke of Jesus *and learn of him*, what will I learn? Certainly humility, but more than that. I'll learn that when

you do what is right in a world that is gone so bad, you'll actually be "persecuted for righteousness sake," as Jesus says in the Sermon on the Mount. This sinful world has everything turned wrong way around. It celebrates wickedness, rewards treachery, and encourages sin. When Christians choose to obey the law, to trouble themselves to help others, to seek the will of God, the culture around us is shown up for what it is, and doesn't like it at all.

In other words, we shouldn't be surprised, as St. Peter tells us, when our good intentions and right behavior are punished rather than rewarded.

Yes, there is some good going on in the world that is celebrated. As I write this people are risking their own lives to dig people out of

collapsed buildings in China and to get relief supplies to cyclone victims who are also victimized by their own government in Myanmar. Our culture does rally around these efforts, and we should thank God that there is still some good mixed in with the bad.

What I want to concentrate on here is the particular question of why it's so hard for Christians as they do what is right in a specifically Christian context. I often think about, for example, our teachers in our Lutheran school. So often they are tired and frazzled from the work of teaching young people about God and his world. Why should that be hard?

Two things. One, even our school is not removed from the world. The young people we teach and the

parents who bring them to us are very real people, influenced by the culture we live in, not always very aware of what the Bible says, but often very conversant with the words of TV, movies, and popular music. Even inside our school our teachers do battle with forces of darkness on a daily basis, and that's hard.

Two, teaching children is hard work. Even on their best behavior, children squirm, they get frustrated, they misunderstand, they find themselves in conflict with other children. Keeping basic discipline and order in a classroom is a real challenge.

You might be thinking, even if you're not a school teacher, "Hey, he's describing my workplace!" That's right! It's not just our teachers who have a challenge as they try to do their jobs, as they try to do right, as they try to serve God by serving others.

My grandfather made it clear that he believed that "anything worth doing is worth doing

well." I would add a corollary, "anything worth doing is probably hard!!"

So I'm writing to encourage you in your hard work. Please don't give up doing what you know is right. Don't lose heart!! Your Savior also faced difficulty as he "went about doing good." That's a start on the reason we don't throw in the towel.

But it goes way beyond that! The victory that Christ won by doing what was right all the way to and through death belongs to us by the power of his resurrection. He offers us his true rest, heaven, and resting places, like our Sabbaths in worship, to keep us faithful and longing for his final rescue. He forgives us when we fail, and lifts us back up to serve him again.

Jesus says, "Take heart! I have overcome the world!" Believe him!

The Missouri Synod Celebrates the Life of Jaroslav Vajda

This American hymnist of Slovak descent went to heaven on May 11, 2008. Although he did not write his first hymn until age 49, he wrote over 200 original and translated hymns that appear worldwide in more than 65 hymnals. Vajda served on hymnal commissions for *Hymnal Supplement and*

Lutheran Book of Worship.

He was the recipient of numerous honorary doctorates recognizing hymnic contributions and was book editor and developer at Concordia Publishing House until his retirement in 1986.

He authored “Go, My Children, with My Blessing” and a new Christmas favorite,

Carnegie Hall

Carnegie Hall's main auditorium seats 2,804 on five levels. It was named for the violinist Isaac Stern in 1997.

The Main Hall is enormously tall, and visitors to the top balcony must climb 105 steps. All but the top level can be reached by elevator.

Most of the greatest performers of classical music since the time the hall was built have performed in the Main Hall, and its lobbies are adorned with signed portraits and memorabilia. Several popular music legends have given memorable performances at the hall including Judy Garland and Dame Shirley Bassey, both of whom recorded live albums at the hall.

You can serve an immediate need by providing assistance to Project IDignity. This is an effort by several downtown churches to provide identification cards to homeless and needy men and women. Identification is essential in order to get a job or qualify for assistance programs. The process is not costly but can be complicated and frustrating for

someone without a home or permanent address.

A three-month trial project has been organized by five downtown area churches to get IDs to those who need them. We are in need of volunteers to help applicants complete forms and greet and direct people to the right resource person to meet their needs. 1. PRODUCE EVERYBODY'S BIBLE STUDY.
"Trinity Ablaze!" has been developed and introduced
2. CREATE TRINITY BRAND DEVELOPMENT AND MARKETING.
On track for summer market research
3. INTRODUCE TRINITY ENTERTAINMENT EVENTS.
Initial planning sessions conducted to launch Trinity Chili Cook off (Fellowship

Board) in November and Christmas Lake Eola Concert (Trinity Downtown Productions) in early December

4. EMPHASIZE MUSIC AND FINE ARTS.
Created "Trinity Friends of the Arts" team and coordinated American Boychoir event as first in "Performing Arts Series." Next events will be in the fall.
5. CREATE ROTATING DINNER CLUB.
About 50 people have participated bi-monthly in dinners in homes. On-going.
6. GROW THE CHURCH FAMILY.
Evangelism Board has year-long plan.
7. COMMIT TO YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULT DEVELOPMENT.
Facility for Youth now part of long-term

8. INTEGRATE AND RETAIN MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH FAMILY.

 9. INITIATE FUTURE CHURCH AND SCHOOL PLANNING.
Congregation has prioritized ministries and validated mission statement. Workshop identified growth expectations. Next step is refining the needs for space by users.
 10. FORMALIZE SCHOOL/CDC IMAGE AND ENROLLMENT PROGRAMS.
Produced new recruiting brochure. May Recruiting Picnic scheduled.
 11. DEVELOP A LONG-TERM PERSONNEL PLAN.
Supported call process for new principal and new youth director. Creating organizational chart from "zero base" to support congregation-identified ministry priorities. Will lead job description and measurement process for all staff.
 12. GROW THE 'NEW DIMENSIONS' SERVICE AND EXPERIENCE.
Initial discussions for overall service design and new music options have been explored. Plan is to complete the overall evaluation and implement fresh service styles by January. New Vicar will lead development team.
 13. DRAMATICALLY GROW STEWARDSHIP.
New "time and talent" quantification in underway, and "volunteer recognition" event is planned for summer.
 14. IMPROVE INTERNAL COMMUNICATIONS.
Studies nearly complete. Recommendations will be available in summer and integrated into personnel planning process.

HEALTH NEWS AND NOTES presented by the Human Care Board

Trinity Health

Many issues in today's medicine lead to confusion and myth. MRSA is a "hot topic" and has worried many people. The more informed you are, the better equipped you are to assess yourself and those around you.

What is MRSA?

MRSA stands for methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus. Methicillin, along with nafcillin and oxacillin are antibiotics that have been used to treat staphylococcal infections in the past. Staphylococcus aureus

is a germ that can be found on healthy skin but it can cause infection too. When Staphylococcus aureus is no longer killed by methicillin, it is said to be “resistant” and is called MRSA. The antibiotic vancomycin is commonly used to treat MRSA infections.

What is the difference between infection and colonization?

Many germs live on and in the body, without causing disease or infection. This is called colonization. Colonization does NOT require treatment. However, these same germs, under the right conditions, CAN cause illness and disease, and this defines infection.

Who gets MRSA and how do they get it?

People who have been ill, have taken many antibiotics or have weakened immune systems due to illness or age are at higher risk for MRSA. MRSA can be passed from person to person by contact with someone who has MRSA. A person who is infected or colonized with MRSA may have it in their nose as well as on their hands. Physical contact from the infected person to others passes the infection along.

What are the dangers of MRSA?

If MRSA infects one who is already ill, it can compound the illness, especially if the person is hospitalized. It will take treatment with the antibiotic vancomycin, as well as more time in the hospital, to recover. Sometimes if the person is very ill, it may prolong the hospital stay indefinitely, or can even lead to death.

How is the transmission of MRSA prevented?

In the hospital setting, a person infected OR colonized with MRSA is placed on “Contact Isolation.” This alerts persons entering the hospital room to use protection (such as masks, gloves or gowns) as needed to help prevent spreading the germ from patient to person. **SPECIAL ATTENTION TO PROPER**

HANDWASHING IS THE MOST IMPORTANT WAY NOT TO SPREAD THE GERM!

What do I need to do at home or in public?

To prevent the spread of MRSA, **WASH YOUR HANDS FREQUENTLY!**

Because hospital staff is exposed to multiple patients, different means of protection help prevent the spread of the disease. The methods listed below are very beneficial for all people to adopt as regular habits for reducing the risk of MRSA:

- Use liquid soap throughout the house; either non-bacterial or antibacterial soap.
- Everyone should wash their hands after contact with you or the items you touch (if you are infected or colonized and are at home.)
- Use non-sterile gloves and **WASH YOUR HANDS** after handling any wounds, dressings, drainage or excretions.
- **WASH YOUR HANDS** before you make any food and before you eat. This should be done by everyone!
- Do not share eating utensils, drinking cups, straws, soda cans or personal items such as bath towels, toothbrushes or razors. This should be done by everyone!
- Wash dishes and eating utensils in hot soapy water or a dishwasher.
- For household cleaning, you can use a diluted solution of water and bleach: one part bleach to 10 parts water. A household disinfectant you purchase will work just as well.
- MRSA, and other germs, can be easily killed on surfaces if you wipe on the solution and let it air dry.
- No special handling of trash is required. **WASH YOUR HANDS AFTERWARDS!!**

General practices to help avoid development of resistant germs:

- Not all infections can be helped by antibiotics. Many infections such as colds are

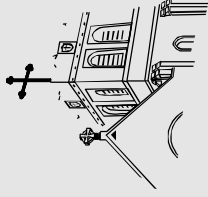

caused by viruses and antibiotics do not help. Demanding antibiotics for these infections will not speed your recovery.

- When taking antibiotics, do not discontinue the medicine as soon as you feel better – take them as prescribed and contact your doctor if you feel worse or think the medicine is causing side effects.
- Throw out any unused antibiotics.

Note the importance of good handwashing. Proper handwashing is not generally practiced by most of the population, so here is the best procedure to follow:

- use warm running water
- apply liquid soap
- lather and rub hands together, pay close attention to palms, backs of hands, finger tips, cuticles and under the nails
- **spend at least 15-30 seconds lathering and washing hands**
- rinse thoroughly

- dry hands with paper towels
- use a paper towel to turn off faucet
- apply lotion several times throughout the day to help prevent dry, cracked skin (which can be an opening for infection).

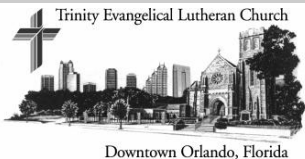
