How Infected are You?

Being contagious appears to be one of the worst things in society. We saw it two years ago when the SARS virus infects a plethora of individuals, in many countries. Health inspectors scurried around finding those infected to help treat them before they infected others. Being contagious doesn't stop with the influenza or a small virus that gets passed around from classroom to classroom. It also is a mentality that becomes infectious that grabs individuals when they least expect it.

Riots and mass beatings are evidence of this. Looking back to April of 1992 when Reginald Denny was ripped out of his truck and beaten by a group of men. These are groups of mass individuals who get caught up in an emotion, tied into a group mentality that ends up being destructive. These though are not the only things that can become contagious in our lives.

Being contagious has a negative connotation with it that doesn't always have to take center stage in our lives. Being contagious can also be something very good. In the book of Acts we read in different situations after the word was preached, after some saw the work of Christ, after some were baptized the church grew. They didn't just grow with the average 20 people on New Member Sunday though. Instead they grew by the thousands and by the tens thousands.

Imagine coming to church on Sunday and seeing three thousand others ready and willing to worship with you. We would be increased in number so much that we would not be able to fit in any of the buildings here on campus. Instead, we would all be on the field listening to Pastor Moore or I give the sermon from the roof of the gym. When there is a contagious Spirit running around our imaginations can't even handle what will happen next.

It is this Spirit that will work through us to be the contagious church of Orlando, but it doesn't just happen overnight. Recently, I have heard some people saying, "It felt so nice and welcoming being greeted at the door

when I came into church this morning". Listening to our returning guests who have mentioned to me that they had a nice visit with the "mugger" that came to their door after they worshiped with us that past weekend. It is this contagious attitude that is changing lives and I don't want anyone of you being left behind.

Being a contagious Christian and then turning Trinity into a contagious church is a team effort. So often we think that I will do something after I see it being done. The problem is that the other 300 who sit around you each Sunday are saying the exact same thing, leaving it never to get done. Sometimes we take for granted that forgiveness that Christ has given us and we want to keep it all for ourselves. That is good, we need to keep it for ourselves, but we also need to share it with those who are around us, and those we do not know.

I have seen a little bit of a change here at Trinity since my first visit back in late May early June. When I came into the church no one knew that walking by them, sitting near them was going to be their new associate pastor. I was not greeted nor was I talked too. It wasn't until Pastor Moore introduced me that people gave me attention. It shouldn't have to take me being introduced as the new associate pastor for people to say Hi to me, give me a smile, or help me when I was confused in the service. It should come because we understand that people matter to God, and they should then matter to us.

If we would start to say Hi, take an interest not only in guests but also fellow members, I will guarantee a different attitude and a different atmosphere at Trinity. The thing is it takes YOU. How contagious would you like to be? How much would you like to see the Lord living in the lives of our church? Only you can answer these questions and I will be curious to see how you respond.

leave earlier this year, and he continues to work on recovery. Jim asked for two things from us, our prayers, and our sensitivity to his family's privacy.

We will be working toward a new Director for our youth, but we will not just jump to find a warm body to fill that position. Instead I'm hoping that the Youth Board will be one of the first places we work on strategic planning, identifying our values, goals, and the necessary action plans, so that when we do engage a new youth worker, that person will have a clear position description and a good mechanism for getting the work done.

Meanwhile, I ask you for your help and your patience. The Youth Board, with special help from Pastor Jon, is once again taking up the slack and making sure that Youth Ministry continues here at Trinity. We might not have the same high energy level at every event that we came to expect from Mr. Luce, but we intend to keep a full schedule of events in place. To do so will require parents and others to really step up to help, and I hope you will answer that call. If you don't know who to talk to but would like to help, please call the church office and we'll make sure you get that guidance!

I'm pleased to say that Mrs. Ronda Krauskopf has accepted our call to continue as sixth grade teacher and to add Director of Christian Education duties to her responsibilities. She will especially be helping us with parish education concerns like Sunday School, VBS,

Bible Classes, etc. We thank God for Mrs. K! Again, if you'd like to help in these areas but have hesitated in the past, call the church office and we'll put you to work!

Speaking of planning ahead, now (not December!) is the time to talk to your family about celebrating Christmas well. So many people get caught up in buying “things” for each other and never actually find the time to worship the Christ who came at Christmas. I would urge you to sit down as a family (by phone or email if you can't be face to face) and talk about what you really value, about what a real celebration of our Savior's birth might look like.

Start with the beginning God promising the Savior that the sinful world needed. Talk about God's choice to enter the world in the most humble possible circumstances, to get to know His people at their own level. Remember how little he really “needed,” and how he gave everything he had to those in need around him. Share how the celebration of Christmas includes the giving of gifts to symbolize God giving the greatest gift of all. Then discuss how your gift giving might best serve that function, and how you might best spend your time in worship and in service toward those in need.

Start now, and don't let the world's “Christmas” wrap you up in a dizzying whirl of parties and gifts. Set your goals and celebrate a real Christmas this year!

this quality.

Today in an effort to emphasize the separation of church and state we hear about court cases in which people are trying to remove "under God" from the pledge and prayer from schools.



Under the theme of free speech radio personalities, television, and movies promote sex, violence, and profanity to raise their viewership. I have no doubt that the devil is hard at work turning our country's God given blessings into resources for

his own work. When Mel Gibson announced that he would produce The Passion of the Christ it was amazing how much negative publicity sprung up concerning a movie promoting the dominant theme of our Christian faith. Yet a movie dominated by unrealistic sex and violence raises no protest because it might violate our belief in "free speech," even though our children cannot always distinguish between what is real and what is not.

Our fore fathers knew in order to form a strong democracy the people had to be educated both academically and morally. Church and school have had a large impact on our culture. Today with our over emphasis on the separation of church and state the church has lost a great deal of its influence. In the name of "church and state" separation public schools have lost their ability to develop students spiritually. Without the Bible for a reference and standard, media and peers have become a greater influence when it comes to teaching

morality and character. Trinity believes strongly with our countries forefathers in the importance of moral and academic education. Like most Lutheran schools we are "Christ centered, Bible based, and life oriented." Part of our life orientation is to prepare our children to be good Christian citizens.

On October 5 we held a mock election for our students. The purpose of this exercise was to have our students experience what their parents have an opportunity to experience at election time. With the help of Mr. and Mrs. Guetzloe we set up a polling place with a registrar, real voting booths, and a real voting machine. The ballots were designed to be similar to the ones that their parent will use next month so that the machine would take them. The day before the election I when from room to room teaching the children how properly choose a candidate. We talked about domestic issues like education, economy, and health care. We reviewed foreign issues like the war in Iraq, the Middle East, and nuclear proliferation. We looked at the person qualities of

the candidates like family, morality, experience, and spirituality.

We even looked at reasons not to choose a candidate for like skin color, speaking ability, and looks.

It was a great experience in citizenship. An experience that some students already take very serious.

Hymn of the Month:

Now Thank We All Our God

Words: Martin Rinkart, 1586-1649

Music: Johann Cruger, 1598-1662

Translator: Catherine Winkworth,
1827-1878

The Thirty Years War of 1618-1648 has been described as the most devastating in all of history, and it gave birth to this great hymn. Martin Rinkart was called at the age of 31 to pastor the state Lutheran church in Eilenberg, Germany. He arrived there just as the dreadful bloodshed of the War began, and there Rinkart spent the remaining 32 years of his life faithfully ministering to the needs of people. The German population dwindled from 16 million to 6 million. Because Eilenberg was a walled city, it became a frightfully overcrowded refuge for political and military fugitives, as well as desperate refugees. Throughout these war years several waves of deadly diseases and famines swept the city, as the various armies marched through the town. The plague of 1637 was particularly severe. At its height Rinkart was the only minister remaining to care for the sick and the dying. Some days he conducted as many as fifty funerals, including his own wife's.

The first two stanzas of the hymn are evidently based on the Apocryphal book of Ecclesiasticus 50:22-24: “Now, therefore, bless ye the God of all, which only doeth wondrous things everywhere, which exalteth our days from the womb and dealeth with us according to His mercy. He grant us joyfulness of heart and that peace may be in our days in Israel forever; that He would confirm His mercy with us and deliver us at His time.” Verse three is a metrical form of the doxology, praising Father, Son and “Him who reigns with them in highest heaven”, the Holy Spirit, so we rise in honor of our Triune God.

An old English preacher once said, “A grateful mind is a great mind,” and the Bible agrees. There are 138 passages of Scripture on the

subject of thanksgiving. Unfortunately, few hymns are devoted exclusively to thanking God.

Romans 8:35, 37 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us.

1 Thess. 5:18 In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

Rinkart knew there is no healing without thanksgiving. He was also blessed with an enduring and steadfast faith that could thank God in all circumstances, even when they were “perplexing” and “harmful”. Remember his story and his suffering when you sing the words of this great hymn.

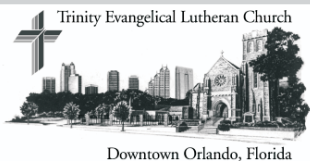
